Tai Sophia Institute is pleased to announce the new **Master of Oriental Medicine (MOM)**. Built on the foundation of Tai Sophia's renowned Master of Acupuncture, the first accredited acupuncture program in the United States, the Master of Oriental Medicine seamlessly integrates traditional acupuncture and Chinese herbs. The program offers a comprehensive curriculum, combining rigorous classroom teaching with a rich clinical experience. Graduates will possess solid knowledge of the theory and philosophy of Oriental Medicine, and the competence to skillfully treat their patients with needles, herbs, words, and a healing presence.

Program Highlights

Professional Opportunities

The success of graduates is a significant measure of any educational institution's value. More than 1,000 graduates of Tai Sophia's Master of Acupuncture and Graduate Certificate in Chinese Herbs are widely dispersed throughout the United States in more than 38 states and five countries.

Combining acupuncture and Chinese herbs in our new Master of Oriental Medicine will serve graduates who desire to practice acupuncture in states that require Chinese herbal studies for licensure.

Many of our graduates also have independent individual and group practices in their communities. Others have shared practices with physicians, chiropractors, and mental health professionals, as well as affiliations with drug detoxification programs, detention centers, and veterinary practices.

Our graduates also are employed in hospital settings, university health centers, HMOs, integrative health clinics, community services, and wellness programs. Graduates are often highly active in educating the public through wellness workshops and seminars, in public and private schools, and at institutions of higher learning.

Program Format

The curriculum consists of ten trimesters, divided into three levels over 40 months. For students beginning in the September 2012 class, core classes are scheduled from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Thursdays and Fridays. These days remain consistent throughout the first five trimesters (Levels I & II). Starting in the third trimester, students begin monthly weekend classes that continue through the remainder of the program. Additionally, students are required to complete twelve credits of elective coursework, which is self-scheduled outside of their core class days, as well as supplemental clinical work in the Community Clinic sites.

As a student begins trimester six (Level III), the core class days are consolidated into one full class day weekly through trimester nine. For students beginning in September 2012, the core class day is Thursday. Also at this point in the program, students are assigned to "core groups," which typically consist of 12 to 17 students and multiple faculty supervisors. Core groups are held Monday through Saturday, and may fall on days other than the days core classes are scheduled.

Students also are required to attend occasional intensive classes, which take place several times each year. The term "intensive" is used to designate special times when the student's attendance is required in addition to the regularly scheduled core class days. Most intensive classes range from two to three days in length, and generally focus on one topic in depth.

The program averages 40 to 48 months for completion, depending on the pace each student sets when building a practice during the clinical portion of the program.

Part-Time Format

The Master of Oriental Medicine program is also available in a part-time, evening format. Designed for working professionals, the flexible, part-time, evening and weekend format is delivered two evenings per week and four weekends per trimester, to be completed in a minimum of four years.

Clinical Experience

The clinical experience in Tai Sophia Institute's Master of Oriental Medicine is unique in design and offers students a rich variety of opportunities to engage with a diverse patient population. Students complete a total of 725 clinical hours – 665 of those hours include directly delivering treatments as a primary practitioner, or assisting other student practitioners in treatment delivery with faculty supervision at Tai Sophia's student clinic.

In addition to this residency-style rotation, students deliver 60 hours of treatments at external Community Clinic sites. Treatments at the external sites focus on addictions, relapse prevention, sobriety support, crisis intervention, relief from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, and bereavement. The scope of services provided includes auricular acupuncture, full body acupuncture, community acupuncture, therapeutic movement modalities, meditation, and support/wellness groups. While only 60 hours are required of our student practitioners, many students surpass the minimum requirement and extend their rotations in order to continue contributing to the healing work that is being fostered at these Community Clinic sites.

Admission Requirements

Degree Requirements

Prospective students must meet the following admission requirements:

- Have a minimum of a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution and submit an official transcript.
- Submit official transcript of highest degree earned beyond a bachelor's degree.

If the degree was not completed at a college or university recognized by a U.S. Department of Education accrediting body, copies of the institution's academic catalog may be required and course syllabi may be requested. International students please refer to the additional instructions outlined under the heading "International Students" in the academic catalog.

Health Requirements

- Current, documented tuberculosis skin test (PPD). If PPD is positive, a completed TB screening form is required.
- A completed "Hepatitis B Vaccination Form for Students" stating prior vaccination, declining vaccination, or indicating plan to receive vaccination. This form and a Hepatitis B information packet will be provided to students prior to the start of the program.

Tuition and Fees

Application Fee: \$95

The application fee increases to \$150 for applications received after October 1 for January classes, and for applications received after June 1 for September classes.
